CONTINUING EDUCATION AT TOURO: RAFAEL CUEVAS PRESENTS THE MEDEK TECHNIQUE

Rafael Cuevas, the renowned Chilean Physical Therapist who founded the Cuevas Medek Exercise (CME) programme for developmentally-delayed children, came to the Manhattan campus to present an introduction to the treatment technique he developed. 30 clinicians attended his lecture, which was offered free to clinical instructors and coordinators, alumni, and students in June 2007.

The CME technique is intended to stimulate proximal stability and function and is founded on the principle of whole body neurological response to instability. Seňor Cuevas' presentation used clinical video clips to demonstrate the progress patients can make after using the CME technique and included a question and answer session.

His passion for the field evident and was the audience benefited from the opportunity to be introduced to this technique bv its originator. Touro College was grateful for his willingness to speak to our clinical faculty.

FIVE FACULTY RECEIVE DOCTORAL DEGREES

Frances Corio, Chair of the post-professional Doctor of Physical Therapy program, is the third physical therapist on the faculty to earn a PhD. She completed her PhD in Health Science Education and Research at Touro University International, California. Dr. **Corio** began teaching at Touro College in 1987, and initiated and developed the Advanced Masters Program in Orthopedic Physical Therapy in 1993. She has been the Chair of the post-professional DPT program since its inception in 2001.

Emil Euaparadorn, Assistant Professor in the Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program, received his Doctor of Science degree from Andrews University in 2007. A 2002 graduate and Maimonides Award recipient of the Touro College Physical Therapy program, Dr. **Euaparadorn** (PT-02, NY) was appointed to the full-time PTA program faculty in 2005.

RECORD CONFERENCE ATTENDANCE SHOWS SUPPORT FOR THE APTA

The Physical Therapy Programs at Touro College have always been strong supporters of the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA). This year the Physical Therapy Department was a recipient of the APTA Facilities Challenge Award, which recognizes institutions that have 100% APTA membership. ALUMNI AND FACULTY PRESENT AT APTA CONFERENCES

Physical Therapy Department faculty and alumni present research each year at American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) and other professional conferences across the country.

In Denver at the APTA annual conference and exposition, Kevin Basile (PT-99, NY) presented "Physical therapy documentation in workers compensation cases: assessing the level of compliance of documentation compared to the existing APTA policy statements." Phaleau Cunneen (PT-02, NY) also presented a case report entitled "Rehabilitation following a two-stage reimplantation with a unique custom femur spacer and total femur prosthesis for infection and periprosthetic fracture." **Cunneen** works at the Hospital for Special Surgery, where he and **Jaime Edelstein** (PT-99, NY) have been speakers in the Current Concepts in Sports Medicine professional development course series. Dr. **Christopher Kevin Wong** and Manhattan DPT Program Assistant Professor Dr. **Stephen Kanter** also attended the conference.

At the 2007 Combined Sections Meeting (CSM) **Dr. Maryanne Driscoll** conducted two educational workshops based on her collaborative research with former Manhattan PT Program Chairperson Dr. Margaret Plack:

In addition to partnering in the clinical education portion of the DPT program, Dr. **Kevin Cerrone** (PT-90, PDPT-06), Assistant Chief Physical Therapist, also teaches Evaluation and Management of the Spine. Southside Hospital has been a source of many adjunct professors over the years; currently Dr. **Jim Megna**, Director of Rehabilitation and Administrator Pat McQuade both teach in the post-professional DPT program.

Southside physical therapists, including Drs. **Cerrone, Abbate,** and **Osman**, have enhanced their own education by earning a transitional DPT degree at Touro College. Likewise, Touro College faculty regularly augment their clinical skills by attending advanced orthopedic manual therapy continuing education courses offered at the Southside Health Institute.
